We believe we can and will share in eternal life with the Lord – in the communion of saints and that in the kingdom of heaven we will not perish.

May we know OUR Shepherd: In the western India, many shepherds gather their various flocks together at night at one place. The call of each shepherd is different and as the sheep hear it they disentangle themselves from the large flock and follow their own shepherd.
